COLLEGE CELEBRATES SUCCESS OF CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The typical year is full of celebrations. Holidays, birthdays and other special occasions help us break the monotony and move from one season to the next.

But on a beautiful, sunny morning in October, Weatherford College had something to celebrate that was unique in the 144-year history of the institution.

As a sizeable crowd watched from a balloon-covered tent, a giant banner was unfurled that proclaimed the final amount raised in the College's first capital campaign in more than a decade: \$2,415,133.

The goal of the WC Foundation's "The Time is Now for Your College" campaign had been well-publicized for the previous two years: \$2 million. If the campaign had only barely met that goal, it still would have quadrupled the largest fundraising effort in school history. But \$2.4 million was well beyond expectations.

Dr. Kevin Eaton, WC president, stepped to the podium and praised the donors that made the celebration possible.

"Because of these wonderful individuals, we not only met our goal, we surpassed it by more than 20 percent," Eaton said. "This speaks volumes about the type of donors who support this historic institution. I am honored to be associated with such outstanding citizens. I can't say enough about them; they truly exemplify the concept of giving."

The campaign, which will fund scholarships, facility upgrades and other projects, was chaired by Bob Glenn, a previous Alumnus of the Year Award recipient and treasurer of the Foundation. Glenn took the time to thank the volunteers who worked on the two-year project, as well as the many donors in attendance.



"This is a real victory for the community today," said Glenn. "Weatherford College is the showplace of Weatherford and Parker County."

The Victory Celebration was paired with another reason to celebrate: the construction of the new Don Allen Health Science Building. Already well under construction, the new 31,000-square-foot building will house WC's nursing, respiratory therapy, radiologic technology, sonography and

FROM WC TO CSI: ALUMNUS EXCELS IN FORENSIC SCIENCE

In 2003, when she was ready for college after graduating as valedictorian from Lake Worth High, Ashleigh Portales had her course set. She was going to Weatherford College to study child development in preparation for obtaining a kindergarten teaching degree.

That is, until she spotted a poster about a new program at WC, and after a call to the information number posted, she was enrolling in forensics and crime scene investigation courses instead.

Not really a surprising turn of events, however. Both of Portales' parents are in law enforcement, and she always had enjoyed TV shows like the hit "CSI."

"But now I scream at the TV when that show is on," said Portales. "Their science is almost always right, but the way they go about solving the crime is almost always incorrect, especially the way they have that one team, partners, taking the case all the way through, from the original crime scene to investigation to finally solving the case in a matter of days. That almost never happens in real life," she said. "Sometimes up to 50 people work on one case before it's all over."

And she should know. As a crime scene investigator and crime analyst herself at the Wise County Sheriff's Office in Decatur, Texas, Portales is a part of a team that handles hundreds of cases each year. Some are fairly routine, some more complex, a few downright gruesome. Portales finds it all fascinating.

"Every day is different, it's a game, a challenge," she said. "Am I smart enough to outsmart the people who think they have outsmarted me?"

Apparently so. A case in point: a recent home invasion. From the physical description provided by the victim, Portales was able to draw a sketch so accurate that, when he saw it in the local newspaper the next day, the suspect just turned himself in.

Don Jacobs, chair of the WC Behavioral Science department, grins at that story and shares a bit of pride in his own part helping Ashleigh get her start.

"Ashleigh Portales is the type of student, the reason that those of us who chose education as our career became educators in the first place. She makes teaching fun because she is attentive to her subjects and is a class leader. Every professional educator deserves a student like her.

"She has become the model student for our forensic science and forensic psychology programs at Weatherford College," Jacobs said. "Making all A's in our program while obtaining several internships (including the Tarrant County ME's Office and the Grand Prairie Police Department), she also obtained her master's degree in forensic psychology from Argosy University, and she was my student assistant, as well!"

And now, Portales is an instructor herself at WC. With degrees in forensic psychology and law enforcement credentials from the state of Texas as a basic peace officer, Portales teaches in the WC Police Academy

two days a week, using comp time earned at the Sheriff's Office ("We put in some long hours sometimes," she said.). Portales uses real-life scenarios to enhance her teaching.

"What we teach in the Academy, I see every day, living, breathing, in action," she said. "Burglary to homicide, psychopaths, killers who could have been serial killers (if we hadn't caught them). We must become desensitized to the horror of it, I tell my students, and simply investigate for the truth.

"We deal with the darkness of humanity, and that's why I tell my students that law enforcement is not just a job; it's a higher calling, and if you don't feel that calling in your heart, then you're probably in the wrong job," Portales said.

At age 28, Portales obviously has found her calling and "just can't imagine doing anything else. (Law enforcement) is the best job in the world, hands down – helping people, serving people, making a profound impact. I guess when I'm too old to chase bad guys, I'll just teach full time."

So, in retrospect, no regrets, then, about her decision to pursue criminal investigation instead of her first plan to be a kindergarten teacher?

"No. In fact, a colleague told me I could get a little of each. Dealing with criminals and children is not that different – they both can lie straight-face to you, they usually get caught, and then they'll do it all over again. The thing is, though," Portales grinned, "the children are cuter."

ITALIAN BARREL RACER RETURNS TO AMERICA VIA WC

For years, the Weatherford College basketball program has had players from overseas dotting its roster. Now, it appears that rodeo coach Johnny Emmons is taking a cue from hoops.

Emmons' newest roster addition is from Italy - the one overseas, not the one in Texas. However, Francesca Riccardi is certainly familiar with a couple of things popular in Texas.

She loves to rodeo and she loves horses.

"I was looking for a college that offered a program of equine science and that had the possibility for me to become part of a rodeo team as a barrel racer," said Riccardi, explaining why she chose Weatherford College.

"I was accepted at other colleges, but all things kept sending me to Weatherford College."

Riccardi's resume includes being the National Barrel Horse Association Italy Junior Champion, Italian and European Youth Reserve Champion, and finishing fourth at the European Championship.

"Barrel racing is tough in Texas, but she has a great reputation and I feel she will be competitive," said Emmons.

Riccardi is no stranger to American rodeos. In fact, she and her family have lived in America previously.

"My parents followed the American dream," she said. "My dad was a football player in Italy and my mother loved horses, so my

sister and I inherited this dream and that's the reason I'm here."

Riccardi said rodeos in America are different from those back home.

"I think it is a more competitive event, while in Italy, it's more like demonstrations and it's all about entertaining people," she said.

And even though she's no stranger to the U.S., she does admit that it is a different lifestyle.

"It's really hard to leave your usual life and get involved in a world opposite of yours," she said. "Here it's all so different. In Italy everything is really small and it's all so close."

Riccardi was raised as a child in Milan before her family moved

Ben and Dora Long celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on Sept. 11 in Weatherford. Ben, a WC alumnus, previously served as county judge


and Republican Party chairman of Parker County. The couple owned and operated a well-known dairy farm for many years.


WC Fall Enrollments over 20 Years





to the smaller town of Voghera and built the Cowboys Guest Ranch, which is focused on American life.

"We have an American restaurant, a saloon, a western store, a small hotel, a theme park with animals like bison, raccoons, horses and cows, and we have two outdoor arenas and an indoor arena with 1,000 seats where we host competitions," said Riccardi.

"I'm excited for her and hope she does well, and I look forward to seeing her compete," said Emmons. "If she does well, she will make an impact on our team. Otherwise, she brings attention to our team on an international basis."

While she does love rodeo, it is not the passion Riccardi wants to pursue for the rest of her life.

"I came here to pursue the equine science program because in Italy, equine studies don't exist," she said. "I really want to know everything about my passion. Here I can study while continuing to grow up as a rider and a person."

As for whether her future lies in America or Italy, Riccardi doesn't really care as long it includes working with horses.

"Horses will always be a part of my life," she said.

phlebotomy programs. The building is expected to open in May, 2014.

A \$400,000 pledge from the Jerry Durant Auto Group, the largest of the campaign, was earmarked for the new building. Jerry and Vickie Durant requested the College name the facility after their longtime associate and WC Board of Trustees member Don Allen. Forgoing the traditional dirt-and-shovel groundbreaking, trustees signed a steel beam that was later installed at the apex of the building. Donors, employees, students and all in attendance were also invited to sign the beam and become a part of WC history.

Brent Baker, vice president of institutional advancement, said seeing the beam covered in signatures reminded him of the vast number of people who participated in the campaign.

"More than 450 donors gave to this project, in gifts of \$50 and \$400,000, and everything in between," Baker said. "That means people from all walks of life felt strongly enough about this College that they wanted to be a part of this effort, at whatever level they could."

Those donors included the College's faculty and staff. Challenged with a \$30,000 goal at the onset, the faculty and staff gave more than \$176,000, setting the tone for other potential donors. The College and Foundation boards responded in kind, eclipsing their goal with more than \$1 million in gifts and pledges.

"When the 'family' stepped up like that, it sent a message that this was important," Baker said. "That spoke volumes to the entire community."

Although there were too many donors to list individually, Baker did recognize several donors who gave/pledged at a level above the threshold for naming WC facilities. Those donors included Jerry and Vickie Durant, William F. Liles, Nancy and Richard Stuart, Ed and Patti Kramer, First Financial Bank, Plains Capital Bank, Dr. Allan Saxe, Rena Mae and Scott Woody, Gary and Linda Snow, Carol Eppright, Dan and Marsha Feely, Frances Zellers, the James and Dorothy Doss Foundation, Marjorie Kimbrough Dome, Roy and Jeannine Eaton and Charlie Gilchrist's Southwest Auto Group.

"I am always astounded by the response that our citizens provide when there is a worthy cause to enhance the quality of life in this community and county," Glenn said. "This has never been more evident than the outpouring of financial support for Weatherford College. Our citizens are proud of our College and the role it plays in providing quality educational opportunities right here at home."


