With a record-breaking 7,242 credit students enrolled in Fall 2025, Weatherford College continues to set the pace as the fastestgrowing college in North Texas, marking a 9.7 percent increase over the previous year and approximately 30 percent more students than two years ago.

The continued enrollment surge is a reflection of the college's expanding academic offerings, state-of-the-art facilities and the culture of caring that allows students and faculty to thrive.

"We are thrilled to see this continued growth," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer "At a time when many colleges across the nation are facing declining enrollment and even closure, WC is thriving."

Weatherford College's success is rooted in a culture of high expectations and deep care for its students. Faculty and staff are not only educators—they're mentors, advocates and champions for student success.

"I reach out to students who are falling behind and offer to help them," said Laura Cummins, Spanish instructor. "I care about them as people, and I want them to be successful in my classes."

This culture of caring is echoed by students like Ivy Powell, a business major and women's basketball player from Killeen.

"It's a great community," she said. "They care about more than just your schoolwork. They care about how you feel."

WC's academic expansion is a key driver of enrollment growth. The college now offers five bachelor's degrees, including organizational leadership, which Mayce Pangle, a student from Denton, is currently pursuing after completing her associate degree at WC in May.

"We're growing so fast because of how many new associate and bachelor's degrees we're getting," she said.

In the robotics and automation program, enrollment has skyrocketed from 54 students in Fall 2022 to 564 in Fall 2025, according to program director Dr. Bill Alexander.

"Articulation of technical degrees to a bachelor's degree has provided greater depth and breadth of a clearly defined pathway for my students," Alexander said. "Many have chosen to continue their academic journey at WC for this reason."

The addition of the Emerging Technologies and Workforce Building has been a game-changer for hands-on learning.

"The ETWB has provided an environment where students choose WC over other schools because of the cutting-edge technology in clean and inviting spaces designed for learning," Alexander said.

Tammie Farr, a welding student in the ETWB, said the environment at WC is supportive, especially for first-generation students.

"If the teachers see that you're putting in the effort, they will help you with just about anything you need," she said.

WC's commitment to affordability and access is evident in its use of open educational resources. All Spanish classes, for example, are zero-cost textbook courses, saving students hundreds of dollars.

"All materials used are free for students and accessed through the Canvas online classroom," Cummins said.

Dual credit enrollment has also jumped 16.9 percent from Fall 2024 to Fall 2025, with 2,471 high school students now earning college credit through WC.

RODEO AT WC

In a region built on ranching heritage and agriculture, rodeo has been a part of Weatherford College for decades.

Tie-down roper Dan Webb is believed to be the first WC alumnus to qualify for the Wrangler National Finals, qualifying eight times between 1978 and 1986. He is a member of the Texas Rodeo Cowboy Hall of Fame.

Mike Brown helped revive the WC rodeo program in 1983. Members of his 2005 team qualified for the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming, and WC has been represented in every CNFR since.

Another hall of famer, Johnny Emmons took over as head coach in 2012. Emmons has coached five individual national champions as well as the women's team national champion in 2022.

For over a quarter-century, Weatherford College's annual performance of Handel's "Messiah" has served as the official musical kickoff to the Christmas season in Parker County, drawing capacity crowds to the Alkek Fine Arts Center.

This year, the college's community tradition returns to the stage at 7 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 8. Admission is free and seating is limited, so arrive early.

What began in 1998 as a simple request from then-WC President Jim Boyd to start a community choir has blossomed into one of the college's most popular and enduring fine arts events.

"The following was instant," said Rob Laney, the choir's founding director and current WC music faculty member. "In the next year, the theatre was so full we had to bring in extra chairs for the audience."

The concert's enduring appeal, which survived a brief silence during the COVID-19 pandemic, is rooted in both the majesty of the music and the dedication of the performers.

Current choir director Rick Rainey, an accomplished musician and adjunct instructor who recently completed his 24th session with the Dallas Opera, brought the concert back with a single expectation: "That the members of Parker County Community Choir that I had enjoyed singing with for so many years would joyously return to sing with us... and so many did!"

Rainey attributes the concert's popularity to its perfect timing and the composition itself.

"Messiah is considered among the greatest musical works ever written, and it has become a part of many families' cherished Christmas traditions here in Weatherford," he said.

He is quick to praise the volunteer spirit of the choir members.

"The best part about directing is definitely the people involved," he said. "This group selflessly dedicates their time and efforts to this performance. It is a sharing of energy and a deep love for music."

Evone Scott, a dedicated choir member since 2002, has missed only one performance. She continues to participate to keep her musical skills sharp and for the camaraderie.

"I also love to reunite with members each year," she said. "Some of us have been together for more than a decade. It is nice to see the choir come back together each year and continue to hone its performance."

Both directors and members have strong attachments to various parts of the oratorio. Rainey names the ubiquitous "Hallelujah" chorus as his favorite for its "majestic triumph, proclaiming that 'The Lord God omnipotent reigneth.'"

"It reminds me of what Christmas is all about and why it is such a celebration of giving and true love," he said.

Laney, however, favors the profound complexity of "Surely He Hath Bourne Our Griefs," noting that the music beautifully mirrors the profound message of grace and peace. Scott said, "For unto us a child is born" is always a crowd favorite.

"I personally love chords with dissonance," she said. "I don't think I could pick a true favorite, but the song 'Since by Man Came Death' holds a special place in my heart. I love the simplicity of the notes, yet the powerful way dynamics and phrasing tell the story of Christ's death for us."

While many colleges across the United States are facing an enrollment cliff due to declining birth rates that occurred after the 2008 recession, WC is defying the trend. Nationally, more than 70 colleges have closed or merged since 2020. Yet, Weatherford College continues to grow thanks to its strategic vision, community partnerships and unwavering focus on student success.

"I think Dr. Farmer has understood the process of growing a brand," said Mike McGough, occupational therapy assistant instructor. "He's provided leadership by being attentive to faculty and staff."

From national championships in rodeo to award-winning arts programs and a growing international student body, Weatherford College is no longer a hidden gem—it's a rising star.

"Our best days lie ahead," said Farmer. "Because now, we have momentum." 🗈





WC FOUNDATION SEES 62 PERCENT GROWTH IN CONTRIBUTIONS

DONORS GIVE NEARLY \$10 MILLION TO SUPPORT STUDENTS IN THE LAST 10 YEARS

The Weatherford College Foundation has announced a 62 percent year-over-year increase in contributions in the 2025 fiscal year, which ended Aug. 31. Donors gave more than \$818,000 to support WC students compared to approximately \$505,000 in the previous fiscal year.

"This year's unprecedented level of giving is a testament to the deep belief our community has in the power of education," said Brent Gough, WC Foundation president. "These contributions directly impact the lives of our students—providing scholarships and ensuring that Weatherford College continues to be a place of opportunity."

Donors have given more than \$9.7 million to the WC Foundation in the last 10 years.

Gifts are designated for a number of programs, with scholarships being the most popular. Individuals, companies and foundations also made gifts to support the Student Emergency Fund as well as WC's fine arts, athletics, agriculture and other programs.

"Yet again, the friends of Weatherford College have collectively gone above and beyond in their philanthropic efforts," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. "Thanks to their generosity, Weatherford College is changing more lives than ever before."

In fiscal year 2025, the foundation received 474 gifts. In addition to multiple five- and six-figure donations, the foundation received more than 340 gifts of \$500 or less. Leaders are also working with multiple donors regarding estate gifts through the foundation's planned giving program.

WC ANSWERS CALL FOR AID IN SAN SABA

















In the aftermath of the July 4 floods in Central Texas, the spirit of service that defines Weatherford College was put into action.

From 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. on July 30, a convoy of 114 students, faculty, staff, and community volunteers traveled to San Saba, transforming a single-day service project into a testament to serving one's neighbor.

"True leadership begins with service to others," said Grant Mills to the Weatherford College Board of Trustees at their September meeting, where he briefed them on the day of service. "Together, we're preparing students not only to succeed academically, but to lead in our community. We are working to create a campus culture where service is not just encouraged, but expected."

The sheer scale of the day was immediate, with volunteers splitting into focused teams to address critical needs. The efforts were coordinated alongside the college's leadership team and community partners to deliver maximum impact.

A team of nearly 40 volunteers, led by Jeff Oaks of Love Weatherford, collected 350 trash bags, nearly doubling his previous personal record for a single day. The team also removed over 4.5 tons of debris from the city's cemetery, park and golf course.

In the overwhelmed fellowship hall of a local church, 10 volunteers transformed the chaos, preparing over 5,000 items for distribution. They organized 30 to 40 tables stacked with clothing and emergency supplies, arranging every shirt by size and color to create a functional "shopping spree" for affected residents.

Another team, working alongside North Side Baptist Church's Special Operations group, cleared four full-sized, grown trees and performed essential fence repair.

An eight-person skills team attended to a local home where floodwaters had destroyed the entire floor. This team replaced the entire subfloor, laid new flooring, and had already begun laying tile before the day concluded.

The fence crew worked throughout the day, restoring more than 150 yards of fence line. This crew removed old posts, used a bulldozer to clean the area, restaked the line and installed new barbed wire.

The visible results of the day's labor were matched by the emotional impact felt by the community.

"All I can say is wow," said Scott Glaze, public works director of San Saba. "Those kids from Weatherford College are truly amazing. They have huge hearts that care about helping people. We are truly blessed by God in this town!"

For his leadership efforts in coordinating this event, Mills received the Presidential Core Value Coin. His coordination of this trip exemplifies the college's commitment to service and community through faith, hope and love.

INTO CONFERENCE HALL OF FAME

The Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference voted WC Athletic Director Jeff Lightfoot into its hall of fame this summer. President Farmer and Board of Trustees Chair Dan Carney surprised Lightfoot with the announcement at the July board meeting.

After 23 years as the WC baseball head coach, Lightfoot became athletic director of Weatherford College in the spring of 2025.

Through the 2025 season, Lightfoot amassed a record of 912 wins, 565 losses and one tie, including four years at Eastfield College and 23 years at WC.





SANDERS INDUCTED INTO STEINWAY TEACHERS HALL OF FAME

Fredrick Sanders was inducted into the Steinway & Sons Teacher Hall of Fame during a ceremony in New York City in October.

The honor recognizes exceptional educators for their commitment and passion for piano instruction.

Sanders, WC's director of jazz studies, is an accomplished performer and educator known for his innovative use of Steinway's

Spirio high-definition player piano technology in the classroom.

He joins the college's Dr. Hyeyoung Song, who was inducted in 2023.

"We are incredibly proud of Fredrick Sanders' accomplishments," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. "It's remarkable for Weatherford College to have one Steinway & Sons inductee — much less two."

A former Weatherford College student, Sanders previously received the college's Distinguished Alumnus Award.

PRESIDENT ANNOUNCES REORGANIZATION

WC President Tod Allen Farmer announced a reorganization of a few key areas of the institution this summer.

Dr. Alex Ibe is now assistant vice president of student services and athletics. Ibe has spent 23 years at the college, most recently as dean of emerging technology and workforce.

Dr. Scott Tarnowieckyi is now associate vice president of academics. He joined WC in 2010, and is moving back to the

instructional area after a time as VP of student services and athletics.

A search for a new dean of emerging technology and workforce is ongoing.

"This administrative reorganization will simultaneously help us to strengthen our leadership team and, more importantly, to further enhance student success in the process," Farmer said.



WC interns assist PCSO through 911 dispatch center upgrade

Weatherford College students made a real difference in their community through hands-on participation in a recent remodel of the Parker County 911 dispatch center.
