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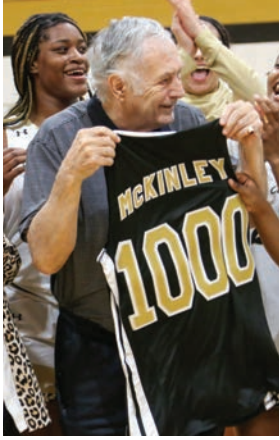

THE NATION TAKES NOTICE

ATHLETICS PUTS WC IN THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

Weatherford College has been developing a reputation across Texas for many years, but lately, the successes of WC's athletic teams at a national level have pushed the WC Coyote brand into another stratosphere.

During the 2024-25 academic year, eight WC teams were nationally ranked, six advanced to their respective national tournaments, and several Coyote athletes led the nation in various statistical categories.

To say that it's been a standout year would be an understatement. And that spotlight exposes the country to not only to WC sports but the entire institution.

"People want to be part of a winning team," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. "Having nationally-ranked athletic squads is one of several factors that have led to Weatherford College becoming the fastest-growing college in North Texas."

Consider the national exposure WC has received in the last year:

- Volleyball – The Coyotes took ninth place at the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division I Championships in Clarksville, Tennessee. Two players – Weronika Urbanska and Gabriella Maldonado – earned All-America honors.
- Basketball – The NJCAA honored Athletic Director Emeritus Bob McKinley with a Coaches Legacy Award, recognizing the all-time winningest coaches in the organization's history. McKinley has 1,027 wins in 40-plus years at WC.
- Baseball – The 2025 Coyotes were ranked No. 1 in the nation for five weeks and finished the regular season at No. 3. Robert Fortenberry was named 2024 National Pitcher of the Year, and

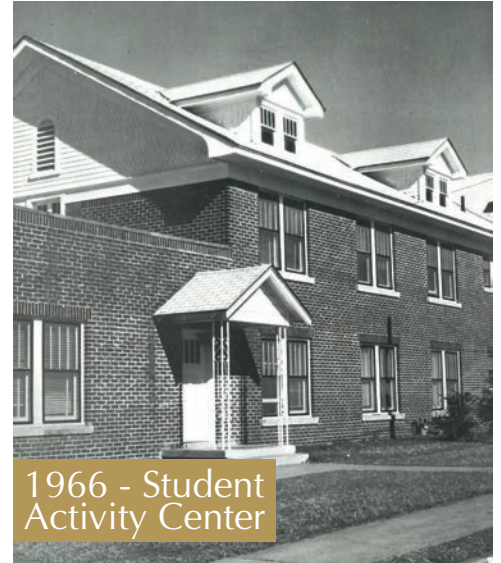
Evan Brandt is a strong candidate for 2025 All-American status, having led the nation in wins.

- Softball – Freshman Sarah Hanf won the National Pitcher of the Week Award twice this season, and earned All-America honors from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.
- Women's Tennis – The Coyotes finished ninth at the national tournament and came in ninth in the final national poll. Claire Mahere was named an ITA All-American.
- Men's Tennis – WC tied for 14th place at the national tournament and was ranked 11th in the final national poll. Andres Serrano earned NJCAA All-America honors.
- Women's Golf – Weatherford took 13th at the program's first-ever national tournament near Garden City, Kansas, with Corrina Haros finishing fifth out of 79 golfers.
- Men's Golf – The Coyotes took 15th place, the second-best finish in program history.
- Rodeo – When The Hilltop went to press, WC was sending athletes to June's College National Final Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming, the college's 21st straight CNFR qualification. Goat tyer Jacee Graff stood at fifth in the country. Catcher Casperson finished fifth at the National Finals Steer Roping held in Clarendon.
- All-Academic – The NJCAA honored 47 Coyotes from across all sports on the national All-Academic teams for grade point averages of at least 3.60.

"The national recognition of athletics brings such positive attention to WC and the Weatherford community," said Tammy Gazzola, president of the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce

ARCHITECTS PRESENT DESIGNS FOR NEW STUDENT UNION

Representatives from Huckabee architects presented a draft design for the new student union building at the Weatherford College Board of Trustees meeting in May.

The five-story building will consist of approximately 116,000 square feet and include a new welcome center; advising, enrollment and financial aid offices; student, staff and community dining spaces; a wellness and veterans center; a student game room; new testing center; faculty and staff offices; multiple meeting rooms of various sizes; a new board room; and a large multiuse space with enough room to host 500 guests for dining.

With the footprint of the building determined, the next step is to select materials and finishes.

The project is projected to break ground in January 2026 with completion in the summer of 2027.

“We’ve been very pleased with Imperial and Huckabee,” said WC President Tod Allen Farmer about the builder and architect of both the Emerging Technologies and Workforce Building as well as Vickie and Jerry Durant Hall. “Twice over they’ve been on time and under budget, and that’s what we look forward to in this next build—on time and under budget.”

WC HONORED AS “MOST PROMISING PLACE TO WORK”

Weatherford College has been named a “Most Promising Place to Work in Community Colleges” by the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development and Diverse: Issues in Higher Education.

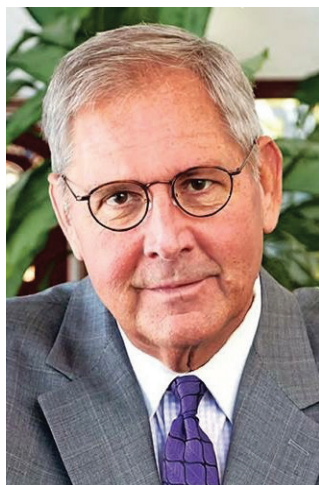

TOM VICK

What is your education and career background?

I attended WISD for most of my youth and graduated from Southwest High School in Fort Worth. I then attended Austin College in Sherman and South Texas College of Law in Houston. I have practiced law in Weatherford since 1981, first with my father, then with Dan Carney, and for the past decade with Holly Hearn.

Who is in your family?

I have two sons and a daughter. My daughter, Vanessa, teaches second grade in the White Settlement ISD. Brock is an entrepreneur living outside Denver, and Gabe Vick III is an attorney in Houston.

What motivates you to serve on the board?

I have a long history of public service. It was instilled in me by my father, who believed we should give back to the community where we live and practice. I was the Mayor of Weatherford at age 27 for two terms, served on the Weatherford ISD Board for two terms, and served the State Bar of Texas in several capacities. Weatherford

College is a dynamic institution. This is an exciting time to be a part of its growth and development. We have an opportunity to change lives. I want to be part of this development, and I believe I possess the necessary background and experience to make a positive impact.

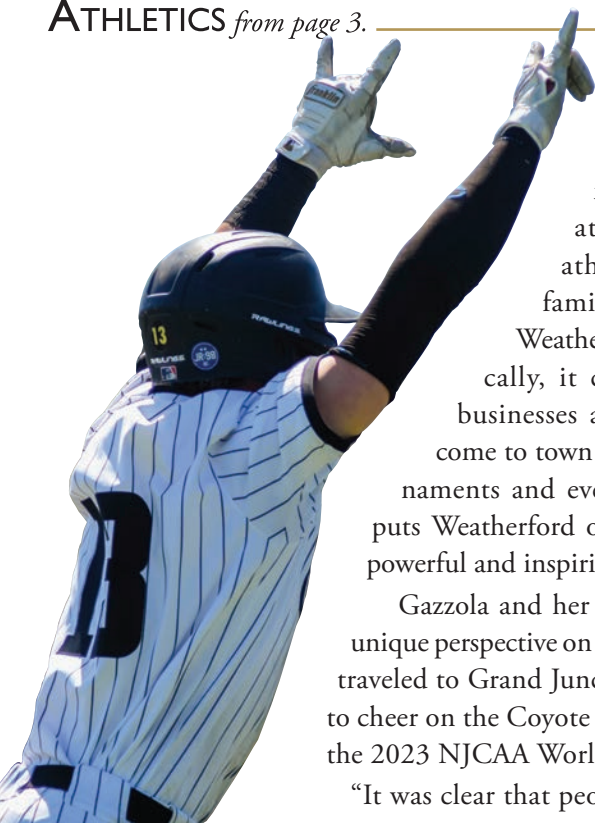
What do you see as WC's greatest opportunity in the future?

WC is positioned geographically to make an enormous impact on the education and development of young people and older students alike in North Texas. We offer a broad range of areas of study but are small enough to be nimble in our offerings as times change. Our greatest opportunity is to meet the demands of higher education and keep our students at the cutting edge of their chosen fields.

What are the greatest challenges for community colleges like WC?

and a WC alumna. "This recognition can also attract students, athletes and their families to consider Weatherford. Economically, it can boost local businesses as more visitors come to town for games, tournaments and events. Overall, it puts Weatherford on the map in a powerful and inspiring way."

Gazzola and her husband have a unique perspective on the topic, having traveled to Grand Junction, Colorado, to cheer on the Coyote baseball team in the 2023 NJCAA World Series.

"It was clear that people knew about

Weatherford because of the athletic program," she said. "The fans from other teams, event organizers and even Grand Junction locals knew about the Coyotes. It was a great experience getting to share Weatherford with individuals who may have never heard about us, and that kind of exposure is invaluable."

The WC Athletic Department has now moved into a new era. McKinley decided to step down as athletic director to focus on coaching women's basketball exclusively. Enter Jeff Lightfoot, who coached Coyote baseball for 23 years and served as assistant AD for 14 years. As of mid-May, Lightfoot is now the college's full-time athletic director.

"I will always love the game of baseball, and I'm grateful for my time spent on the diamond," Lightfoot said. "That being said, I have always had the desire to lead on a large scale. I'm blessed to get the opportunity to do that at Weatherford College. The vision that President Farmer and the WC Board of Trustees have for this college and Coyote athletics is exciting. Great things are on the horizon, and I can't wait to get to work."

WC SET TO LAUNCH KEY NEW PROGRAMS FOR FALL 2025

COLLEGE EXPANDS OFFERINGS IN TECH, HEALTHCARE, TRADES AND MEDIA, PROVIDING AFFORDABLE PATHWAYS TO HIGH-DEMAND JOBS

Weatherford College is set to launch seven new academic programs this fall, marking the largest expansion of academic programs in the college's history. This move reinforces the college's commitment to providing affordable, high-quality education that directly addresses critical workforce needs and offers clear pathways for student advancement.

The **Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Computer Science** provides a flexible and comprehensive pathway for students with an associate degree in information technology to advance their careers. This program is designed to help graduates build on their existing knowledge, gain new skills and effectively compete in the fast-growing technology sector. It particularly benefits those looking to advance into higher-paying roles. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, computer science jobs boast a median annual pay of \$78,690.

The new **Associate of Applied Science in Medical Laboratory Technology** is a 60-credit hour program that trains students for essential healthcare roles. Medical lab technicians are crucial to patient diagnosis, analyzing blood and body fluids to help doctors detect diseases and guide treatment. With 85 percent of clinical diagnosis decisions relying on lab test results, MLTs are in high demand across hospitals and clinics. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects strong job growth for MLTs, with a median annual salary of \$60,780. This program also offers paths to bachelor's or even doctoral degrees in the field.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Golf and Sports Turf Management** provides specialized training for careers as golf course and sports turf superintendents. This unique program uses the recently donated Canyon West Golf Course as a real-world classroom, providing students with unmatched hands-on experience in maintaining turf, managing courses and practicing environmental care. The curriculum directly addresses the industry's needs for highly skilled professionals.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Automotive Technology** gives students extensive hands-on experience across a wide range of automotive topics. This includes electrical systems, brakes, steering, engine repair, climate control and hybrid systems. An automotive technology degree prepares graduates for both hands-on technical jobs and management positions in today's rapidly changing automotive industry. According to the Bureau of Labor

Statistics, the annual median pay for automotive technicians was \$47,770 in May 2023. This program also offers scholarships through Gilchrist Auto Group for selected participants.

The new **Associate of Arts in Mass Communication** allows students to explore various career paths in journalism, radio announcing, marketing and public relations. Students in this program will take classes alongside those in the AAS in Radio/TV Broadcasting, gaining practical experience that can lead directly to jobs or transfer seamlessly to bachelor's degree programs.

Complementing the Mass Communication AA, the **Associate of Applied Science in Radio/TV Broadcasting** teaches students practical skills for careers such as radio announcer, public relations specialist and journalist. Students will have unique opportunities to learn from experienced radio personalities at The Coyote radio station, receiving invaluable real-world training. The Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates a median annual pay of \$57,500 for related occupations.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Culinary Arts** will provide a cook/baker certificate and an associate's degree specializing in culinary arts to train chefs within the hospitality sector. The Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates a strong growth rate of 22 percent for chefs and head cooks through 2030, highlighting the demand in this sector.

"Weatherford College is strongly committed to providing affordable bachelor's degrees and valuable workforce credentials," said WC President Tod Allen Farmer. "We are expanding opportunities for our students while also supplying the skilled workers our local businesses need. These new programs are a direct result of extensive industry feedback and careful planning, ensuring our graduates gain relevant skills for in-demand jobs at an affordable cost."

In its ongoing commitment to academic innovation, Weatherford College has also recently added the following programs:

- BAAS in Early Childhood Education and Teaching
- AAS in Welding
- AAS in Robotics and Automation Technology

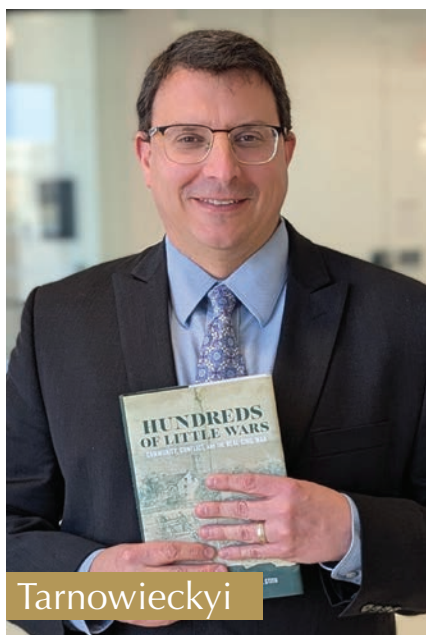

Beginning in the 2025-26 academic year, the WC Foundation is launching the Weatherford College Patrons of the Arts Society.

By spotlighting philanthropy for the arts and recognizing donors in a unique way, the initiative aims to elevate the resources, facilities and opportunities of WC Fine Arts to rival those of four-year institutions, creating exceptional artistic experiences for all stakeholders.

The society is the brainchild of Rebecca James, the college's chair of fine and performing arts. She made a presentation to the WC Foundation Board in the spring and received an enthusiastic response.

"The WC Patrons of the Arts Society is a vibrant bridge between creative expression and community," James said. "Our members' unwavering support will create a close-knit family of arts-focused donors whose connections and philanthropic spirit run deep."

The society will recognize donors of \$1,000 or more on a digital display in the Alkek Fine Arts Center. This "Virtuoso"

level of patrons will also receive a special car decal and be invited to an annual complimentary artist-led workshop or behind-the-scenes technical demonstration. The Virtuoso level will also recognize those with 31 or more volunteer hours with WC's fine arts programs.

Donors above \$10,000 will be called "Visionaries" with donor spotlight recognition, mentor matching with a student, a photo with President Tod Allen Farmer on display in the Alkek, the opportunity to audit a course and other benefits.

All society members will receive specialized email updates and invitations to select Fine Arts events.

"The impact of this group of patrons will resonate throughout Weatherford and Parker County, transforming artistic potential into a thriving, accessible arts scene that enriches the lives of all who call this region home," James said.
