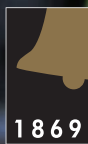

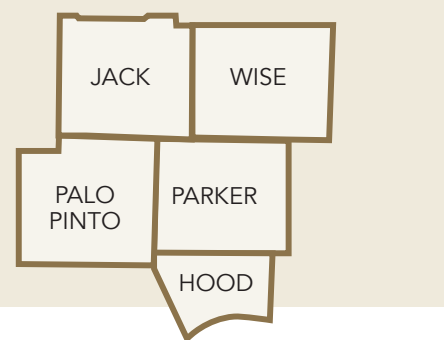

NEW PROGRAMS AT WC

EXPANDING STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES

Weatherford College launched seven new academic programs in the Fall 2025 semester, marking the largest expansion in college history. This move reinforces our commitment to providing affordable, high-quality education that addresses critical workforce needs.

The **Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Computer Science** provides a comprehensive pathway for students with an associate degree in IT to advance their careers. Designed to help graduates build on existing knowledge and gain new skills, this program positions them to compete for higher-paying roles in the fast-growing technology sector.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Medical Laboratory Technology** is a 60-credit-hour program training students for essential healthcare roles. Medical Lab Technicians are crucial to patient diagnosis, with 85 percent of clinical decisions relying on lab results. MLTs are in high demand across hospitals and clinics.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Golf and Sports Turf Management** provides specialized training for careers as golf course and sports turf superintendents. Using the Canyon West Golf Course as a real-world classroom, students gain unmatched hands-on experience in turf maintenance, course management and environmental care.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Automotive Technology** offers extensive hands-on experience

across a wide range of automotive topics, including electrical systems, brakes and hybrid systems. Graduates are prepared for both technical jobs and management positions. Scholarships are available through Gilchrist Auto Group.

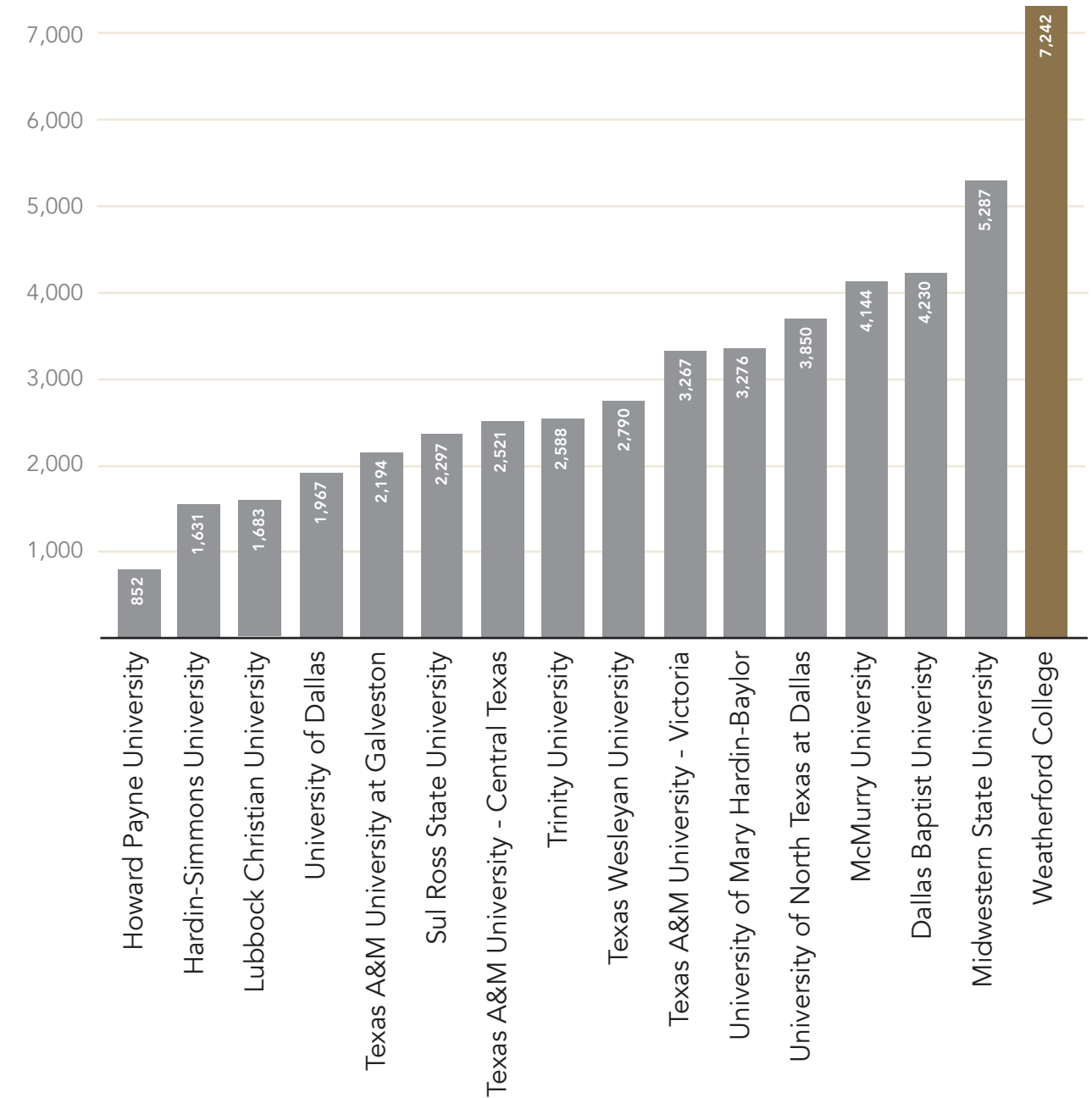
The **Associate of Arts in Mass Communication** allows students to explore careers in journalism, radio announcing, marketing and public relations. Students take classes alongside Radio/TV Broadcasting majors, gaining practical experience for direct employment or university transfer.

Complementing the Mass Communications AA, the **Associate of Applied Science in Radio/TV Broadcasting** teaches practical skills for careers such as radio announcer and journalist. Students learn from experienced personalities at The Coyote radio station, receiving invaluable real-world training.

The **Associate of Applied Science in Culinary Arts** specializes in culinary arts to train chefs within the hospitality sector. The Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates a strong growth rate of 22 percent for chefs and head cooks through 2030.

Additionally, the Board of Trustees approved an **AAS in Dental Hygiene** for the WC Wise County campus, beginning Fall 2026. Other new programs include an **AAS in Early Childhood Education and Teaching**, **AAS in Welding** and an **AAS in Robotics and Automation Technology**.

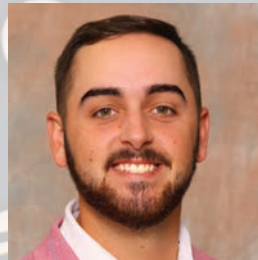

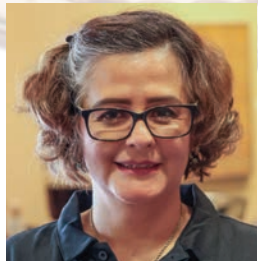

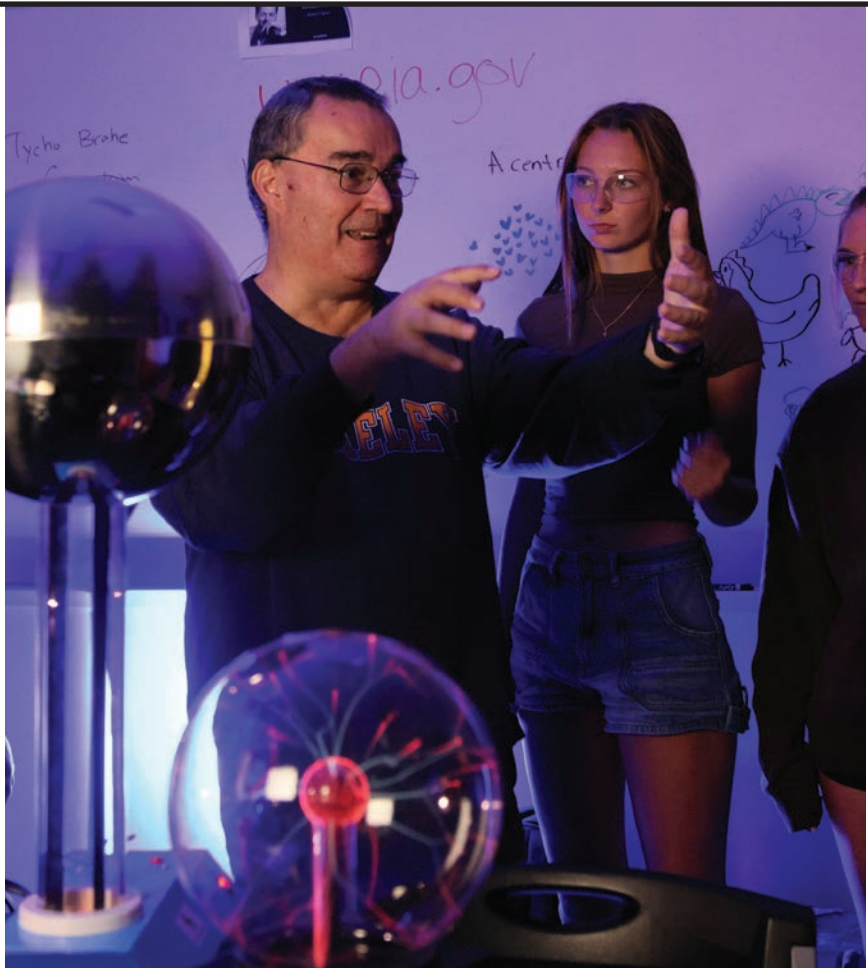

SERVICE

At WC, service is more than an ideal—it is a defining element of our campus culture. Students, faculty and staff embrace opportunities to support communities both locally and across Texas, demonstrating the college’s commitment to compassion, leadership and civic engagement.

This year, 34 WC students traveled to San Saba for a day of service supporting relief efforts following the July 4, 2025, Central Texas floods. Working alongside local partners, volunteers collected 350 bags of debris, repaired 1,200 feet of fencing, installed new flooring in a damaged home and sorted more than 5,000 donated clothing items.

Service also flourished close to home. The Coyote volleyball team spent a morning at Curtis Elementary School, reading to students and greeting children as they arrived on campus. Agriculture students continued their longstanding tradition of volunteering at the Fort Worth Stock Show, with

up to 20 students assisting with youth goat judging, youth quarter horse judging and collegiate livestock judging events.

WC’s Upward Bound students dedicated their time to the Weatherford/Parker County Animal Shelter, walking dogs and cleaning cages to support the daily operations of the facility. Members of the college’s new chapter of the National Society of Leadership and Success participated in Impact Day, completing cleanup projects across the community.

Art students enhanced the Alkek Fine Arts Center by creating and installing artwork celebrating iconic

authors and artists such as Edgar Allan Poe. Honors Program students contributed as well, clearing brush and picking up trash along a busy local farm-to-market road. Cybersecurity students lent their expertise to the Parker County Elections Office, helping monitor polling systems on Election Night to ensure a smooth and secure process.

From creative contributions to critical community support, Weatherford College students continue to embody the spirit of service—demonstrating leadership, generosity and a commitment to making a difference.



CAMPUS EXPANSION

The fences are up, the ground is broken, and Weatherford College's most ambitious building campaign is officially underway.

Following the installation of construction fencing around the main parking lot during winter break, the college broke ground on the new student union in early 2026, kicking off a project that will transform the heart of the campus.

Designed by Huckabee architects and built by Imperial Construction, the five-story, 108,657-square-foot facility is scheduled for completion in the summer of 2027.

Once finished, the building will serve as a comprehensive one-stop shop, housing a welcome center, advising, financial aid, a testing center and a veteran's center. It will also feature a student game room, dining spaces for students and the community, and a multi-use hall capable of hosting 500 guests.

The \$105 million project is funded through tuition revenue bonds, ensuring no impact on local property taxes.

Beyond the union, the campus footprint continues to evolve. To prepare for the union construction, the college completed overflow parking lots east of Durant Hall and modifications to the Alkek lot prior to the Spring 2026 semester. Additionally, the new Gold Lot now offers covered premium parking featuring solar panels that power EV charging stations and reduce utility costs.

Work has also begun on the athletic side of campus. Brush clearing and dirt work are completed in preparation for six new practice tennis courts, marking phase one of the future Stuart Tennis Center.

The college continues its partnership with the City of Weatherford with the addition of security cameras and lighting installed along the Town Creek Trail extension on the backside of Stuart Field and Roger Williams Ballpark.





BACHELOR'S DEGREES

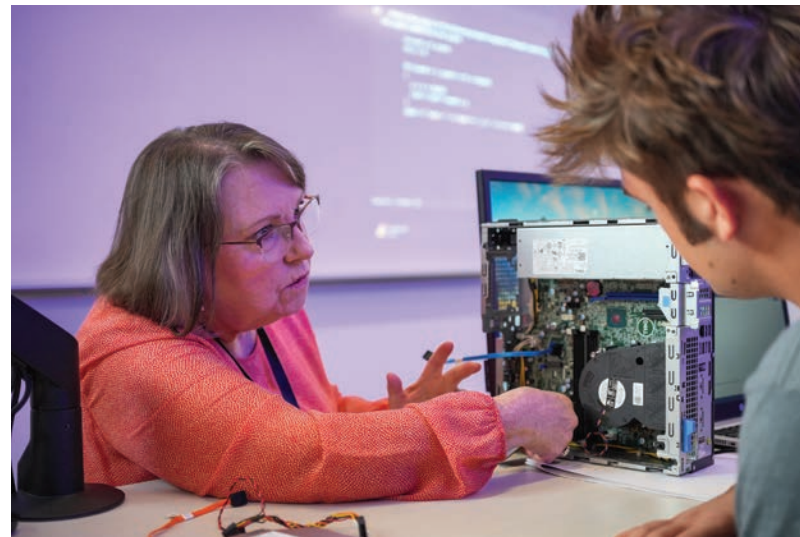
A bachelor's degree at a community college price. That sounds too good to be true, but Weatherford College is offering just that in five high-demand programs.

The newest degree in the bachelor's program lineup is the **Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Computer Science**. This hybrid program is preparing students for in-demand software development, cybersecurity, and data analysis careers.

The **Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Early Childhood Education and Teaching** program, added in 2023, addresses the critical need for qualified educators, equipping students with the skills and knowledge to excel in early childhood classrooms.

WC also offers a **Bachelor of Science in Nursing**, an online program that provides registered nurses a convenient path to career advancement; a **Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Organizational Leadership**, designed for working adults to cultivate essential leadership skills applicable across various industries; and a **Bachelor of Applied Technology in Medical and Health Services Management**, an online program that prepares graduates for leadership roles in the dynamic healthcare sector.

With its focus on quality, online learning, and practical skills development, WC continues to make bachelor's degrees accessible and attractive to a diverse range of students.

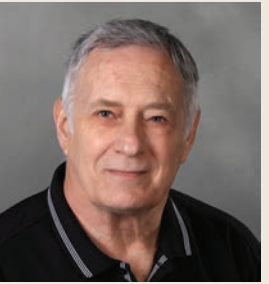


DURRETT RECOGNIZED BY SAMMONS CENTER FOR THE ARTS, PRESIDENT FARMER

Fredrick Sanders, WC's director of jazz studies, was inducted into the Steinway & Sons Teacher Hall of Fame in October. Sanders is a renowned performer and educator and is a recognized leader in using Steinway's Spirio high-definition player piano technology in educational settings. He joins WC's Dr. Hyeyoung Song in the Hall of Fame. Song was inducted previously, making Weatherford College one of the few institutions with multiple faculty members honored by Steinway.

WC RECEIVES TWO NATIONAL MARKETING AWARDS

WC received two gold Paragon Awards from the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations at the council's national conference in March. WC's marketing and public relations team was awarded for a viral social media video created by Crystal Woerly, director of public relations, and a large mural installed in the Durant Hall weight room created by graphic designer Leslie Richardson.

WC AG STUDENTS SHINE AT TJCAA CONVENTION

Weatherford College students brought home multiple awards from the Texas Junior College Agricultural Association Convention, held in April, including two first-place prizes: Makenzie Bowman in equine science and Mary Karen Oneil in wildlife. The Weatherford College Agricultural Chapter also earned second place in the outstanding chapter category and third place in sweepstakes.

FINE ARTS AT WEATHERFORD COLLEGE

The arts remain a vibrant part of the Weatherford College experience.

Rebecca James, WC's new fine and performing arts department chair, launched the WC Patrons of the Arts Society in the fall. The new WC Foundation initiative publicly recognizes fine arts donors and enhances their experience with specialized events.


The WC arts banner flew overseas, as a delegation traveled to South Korea to establish new institutional partnerships and find first-rate talent. President Tod Allen Farmer met with several universities and forged alliances for the arts, and Dr. Hyeyoung Song and Fredrick Sanders auditioned world class musicians.

Speaking of Sanders, he was inducted into the Steinway & Sons Teacher Hall of Fame in a ceremony held in New York City. In addition, Dean of Arts Emeritus

Duane Durrett was recognized by the Sammons Center for the Arts with a Legends of Jazz Award (see p. 24).

The 7th annual WC International Piano Competition saw 200 entrants from 25 countries, with 12 finalists performing at the Alkek Fine Arts Center. Huan-Ching Chou, a native of Taiwan studying at The Julliard School, won first prize.

And throughout the year, the Alkek Center stays alive with fantastic student performances and exhibitions in the disciplines of theatre, visual arts, jazz, piano, choir and opera.

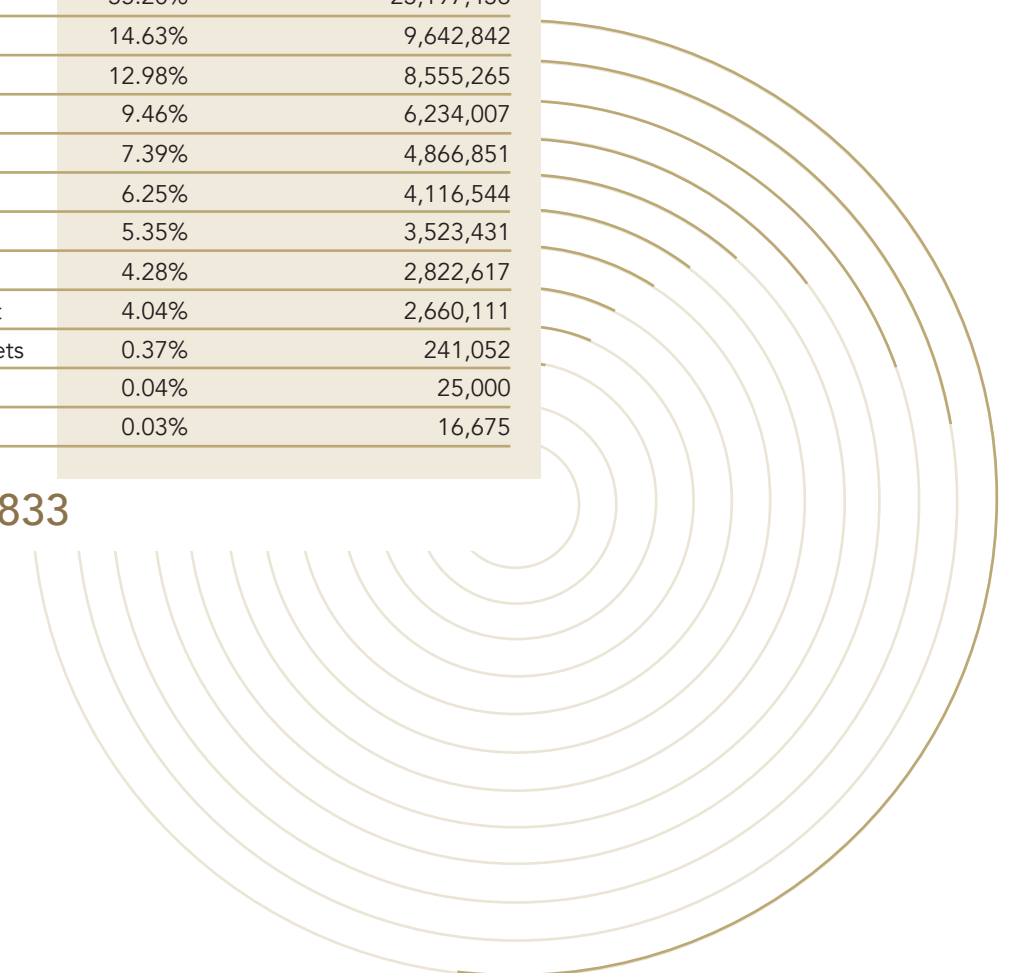

In 2008, Wise County voters demonstrated their strong support for higher education by approving a branch campus maintenance tax. That commitment led to the opening of the current WC Wise County

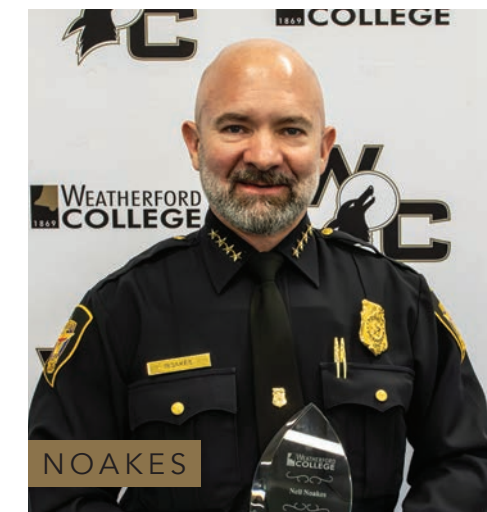
campus in 2012, providing a modern, permanent home for students and the community.

HONORS PROGRAM

The Weatherford College Honors Program is experiencing a surge in participation, nearly doubling its enrollment in the spring 2025 semester alone.

Launched during the 2021-22 academic year with an initial cohort of 28, the program has grown to 42 active participants. The group represents a diverse cross-section of the campus population, including student-athletes, veterans and international students.

The program's mission is to foster intellectual, creative and personal growth through inquiry and research.

The curriculum is designed for students seeking to push beyond standard coursework, offering 20 advanced options in fields including English, math, government, psychology and fine arts. Instructors

challenge honors students with specialized assignments and research projects within smaller class settings.

To graduate with honors, students must maintain a 3.33 grade point average, complete at least 12 hours of honors coursework, perform five hours of community service each semester and complete a capstone project. Students seeking the "distinguished honors" designation face an even higher bar: completing 24 credit hours of honors coursework and 10 hours of service per semester.

Since the program's inception, 26 students have graduated with honors distinctions. Two of those achieved distinguished honors, and four transferred directly into university-level honors colleges.

As Weatherford College prepares to embark on a new era defined by record growth and historic campus transformation, the institution paused in October to honor the educational giants and servant leaders whose commitment embodies the college's spirit.

"Seven years ago, the idea of bringing world-class pianists from over 25 countries around the world to Weatherford, Texas, sounded like a delusional pipe dream," Farmer said. "Thanks to the unparalleled service of one truly exceptional woman, that pipe dream is now a vibrant reality."

The luncheon featured updates on the college's record-breaking enrollment and its numerous academic and athletic achievements from the past year.

Farmer closed the ceremony with a mandate to the students in attendance, reinforcing the institution's core mission and vision for the future: "You are our highest priority. This is your opportunity to work hard and turn your dreams into reality. This is our college, and this is our time!"

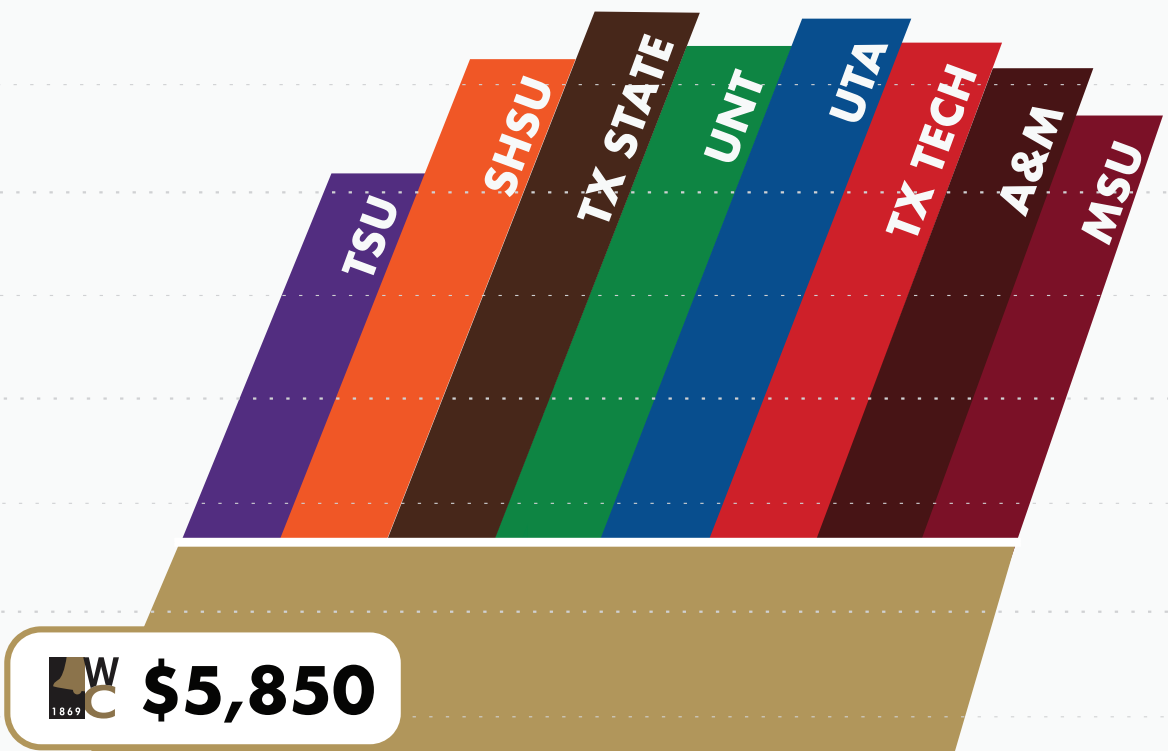
